One should not engage - in such a closed range approcah to a political environment. You have enjoyed -the hospitality , you should participate in Guyanas political struggles. -he said he's speaking of this, not as something he disrespects, but something -like Thomas Maro who left with agroup to an etopian island because he saw that -the capitalist system brought on some injustices. Have you gone to the top, have you seen -the Prime Minister? -we told him we had written, but not seen him for this -Daniel said he thought we had some possibilites of getting ourselves -established through him. Yesterday, Wednesday March 15th, a situation occured at Tacuba Lodge which is an apartment building where people who work at various embassies live. Bob a Bob and I went there to procure and when we got in, we met a man who I had spoken with before somewhere (a cuban by the name of Hernandez) he works at the Cuban Embassy and Bob and I had met him before when we were out doing our work and we happened stop by the house of the Cuban Doctors. Anyway, he works at the embassy and is not an ambassador nor ar main administrator. He told us to come up to his apartment, and we could talk to him there. After wez spoke to him for a few minutes, he gave us a donation of 10.00 Then we left out of his apartment and passed by some others and we thought it would be a good opportunity to get some large donations so we went to one apartment and they said to come back in a few minutes because they were in the shower so then we went to the next apartment who was a man from the Irish Embassy and he got upset that someone had gotten in the building is and got through the security. He 's said that anyone that goes up: to the apartments is supposed to go thoughthe security first and that the security is supposed to call up there and let the home. So he went with us down to the lobby and was asking the security guard about how we got in and the guard explained that we went in with the Cuban. The Irish man said that we used Mr. Hernandex to get in the building so that we could go around in the building. We were very apologetic over and over and said that if we would have known that it was going to cause all of this trouble we wouldn't have come in the first place. The mangger who was there also, a young East Indian woman was very nice and stood up for us. She said that she had met the Smalls, some people who came to our party. Apparently they had spoken well of us. The Irish man was very indignant and wanted our phone number and Adress. He called the house and spoke to Tim Carter. He asked if we lived there and Tim verified it. Then and said that we could go . and that it was okay. Then the man calmed down a little I was worried about the fact that this may have cause some problems in our relations with the Cubans and us., But afterwards the Irish man was polite to the Cuban man and thanked him for coming down to speak with him. I don't think there will be any problems. That same night, last night, the head administrator came over with his wife refer a visit and was very kind. He has come over and visited before. His name is Alfredo. He is the head administrator at the cuban Embassy.

## North Korean Embassy (visit with Marcie, Debbie, Ava, Sharon)

-they seemed deeply moved that Jim and Marcie manatha had adopted Korean children and gave them an opportunity to grow up healthy and socialistic they say we are progressive and humanitarian and they are very interested in further contact with us

(otheir Ambassador is quite available to talk to us and greet us and is

(or appears to be) a kindly friendly man
-I am not too sure of these people as I am not that familiar with the
Korean culture/ they are overwhalmingly polite in their speech and yet
frankly inquisitive about us, even asked Marcie how old she was and how
old JJ is

-I think they are cultivating us for some purpose (perhaps to send letters from the US to people to ask for support from US officials for re-unification of Korea)(not that this is something that would be bad for them to cultivate us for, but it seems that they are quite eager for us to be in contact with them

-they offerred us lots of refreshments/ it is strange how they serve you, they have one of the women come it with glasses of soda (soft drinks) and then they refill the glasses for you and even if you have some left in your glass they take all the old glasses and bring new glasses full

-them women seem very subservient and in the movie they showed, the college or training programs seemed to show very few women in the classes/ the women are beautifufly dressed and look "feminine" (you don't see the fatigues or pantsuits or coveralls that women have adopted in some socialist cultures) -the language of the Korean officials at the Embassy as I said is very polite, they thank you for everything/ if you come to visit the Embassy they thank

you even if they have served you refreshments

-they gave us a background of their leader Kim Il Sung and their struggle
against US Imperialism, they said that right now in Korea, there are war
exercizes being done by the US soldiers / he said that both the peoples
of North and South Korea want to be reunited but it is an aftificial barrier
exercized by the US separating children from parents, separating friends and
relatives and the US soldiers will shoot someone who wishes to come from

South to North Korea/
-they hold their leader Kim II Sung very high and they do not criticize much their country, they have a almost reverent religious feeling about their leader and their country (very careful propaganda). They almost worship the house Kim II Sung was born in.

-they said that Peoples Temple had sent some kind of best wishes some time ago the Korea on some occassion so they were aware of our progressive support some time ago

-they show obvious reverence to Marcie, recognizing her as very important in status in PT - during the movie the man who was explaining the scenes (as it was in Korean) spoke quietly to Marcie explaining it to her alone (they seem very anxious to meet JJ) - they plan to come to Jonestown in May or June (their national celebration in April will keep them busy as Kim's birahday is April 15 and 15 is a national holiday)

-they say they have good relations with all socialist countries; China as well as USSR and Guyana (Japan is of course their imperialist enemy from way

back)
-Ginsing which they widely use is called something else in Korea because the word Ginsing is a Japanese word/ they make a whisky out of it with the root in the bottle/ we didn't drink it because we told them we don't drink (they served it to us) but they claim the whisky is healthful and makes you youthful (perish the thought you'd have to go backwards)

-we inquired about growing the ginsing but it is difficult to grow except in a certain kplace where it grows in No. Korea, other places it grows quite well but they claim it doesn't have the healthful properties except when it grows inthis one area (they say So. !) KOREN EMBASSY: Cde. Lee, Cde. Joe, Visited by, Marceline J, Ava J, Lew, Deb, Kim Yoon Ai, Sharon....Cde. Lee said he enjoyed very much our wonderful performance, and enjoyed our introduction about our agricultural project. Marceline said, "We feel very close to the Koren people". She told him she had adopted three children from Korea. Cde. Lee asked Lew if he spoke the Korne language. (served soft wrinks and plenty of refreshments) Cde Lee said he was told before that there was an agricultural project from people who came from the states..said Sharon had explained and he had a better understanding. Marceline gave him some background on Lew and Kim. Lee said from our art and activities of craft, work, and pictures on display, said its arather small scale, but of course we can learn from the way. Leesaid they would be dning a presentation at the cultural center hopefully in the near future. Heasked what is the difference of clim ate-from J/town to G/town, Marceline gave afew details, including 900 acres planted and 1200 acres cleared. He asked about our water, do we have a well or a stream? We told him about the wells. He said. "In a certin sense you are an independent anonomos kingdom. He came the begining of last January to Guyana and talked about the dif. of the weather. Cde. Lee mentioned that through the pamplet he read, there are some manouvers to do harm to our movement for the support of of the struggles against the raciset in Africa. The activites of ours are enjoyable, and he was obliged to express his thanks to Jim Jones for his efforts to take care and grow up their Koren boy, he said. Lew performed so excellently and all the performances were good. Although you are orphans in the past, you have grown up and now can manage your own life on your own foot, he said Marceline said it was a privaledge that they had come all the way from South Korea to us and that his words were touching. Lew said he had no memories of Korea, but his mom had a tendency to keep all the clippings and pictures and that it was a time unusual for people to adopt people of any racial backgrounds, but he had been treated very well. "They ve been my mon and dad and always will be Lew said. Marceline said, well we want you to keep your Koren background. Lew said he wanted to keep his Koren background. Marceline told lee, Lew was abondoned and his mother was loving to leave him so he could get food, she could think of nothing more painful then to not be abbe to feed your child. said Lew's name was a Koren name. Hesaid in Korea it would be spelled Rxu, pronounced Lew. He asked about Kim's husband, what did hedo? They brought out a drink that they wanted us to take, made in Korea. Sharon told him of our commitment to our youth and that we don't drink. It was called Insam, made from Gensin tea, it had the actual root in the bottom of the bottle. He thought it would grow in Guyana, but he didn't know if it would hold the same value in that other, countries try to grow it and it does well, but it doesn't have the same nutritional value. Marceline asked about acupuncture, he aid it was used in korea, Lee asked what Marcelins older daughter was doing? Marceline told them Suzanne was in the United States and was working for the federal Govt. Lee said they had a saying in Korea..affection which comes from growing a child is much stronger then affection that comes from giving birth, he noted that Lew and Kim were both full blooded Korens, they had many mixed Korens in his country and he could tell by looking. He asked Marceline. "It doesn't make any difference to you, does it?". Marceline said of course it did not. Cde. Lee asked Lew how long he had been a muscian and what other instruments did he play. Lew told him and said he like instruments of different cultures. Lee told him of diff. instruments in Korea including ones invented in 640 A.D. Lee told of the differences of North Korea and South Korea and the propaganda told to the South Koreans. the people think all people live under one roof and eat from the same pot with the same spoon. He mentioned that they may be performing also at the culture center, putting on a art show, they have been

praised all over the world for their art. Lee said he understood Peoples Temple was striving for Socialism, some people use it for propaganda, so they like to describe their form of Socialism. He said Socialism to them is a world where the welfare of the people is highly shared. Our country is not so big, almost the same as Guyana, but the population is larger. He told us of the History...

For thirty-six years they were under oppression, there was so much illitercy, The independence movement had taken up some arms in struggle, but was not sucessful because of division of leadership. Not until their present leader took over did they start to become guided in the correct way. Their present leaders father was the leader of the Koren National movement, started at the age of fourteen w/ slogans of "Down with imperlism", and from that time on became a revolutionary. He organized the anti Japense Koren Army and waged an armed struggle for fourteen years. He is presently sixty-six yrs. of age. Cde. Lee said he was told that Rev. Jim Jones sent congraglations to the people and the leader of Korea on his birthdate. (none of us knew anything about it, but agreed that he had). He said that two yrs. after their independence the U.S. brought fifteen countries against them. At that time there were four hundred thousand people living in the capital city of Korea, and the U.S. was responsible for four hundred thousand bombs being dropped in the city, there was not one building left standing. He said their basic purpose was to come to Socialism then to Communism. They had a democratic revolution, then a Soc. Revolution. He said their asian civilization was so backward. They did not have material or finances. The Japanese tried to carry out the Koren ignorance policy and today they find they only have three engineers throughout the country. After the war they couldn't get foreign currency abroad, so the people had to tighten their belts. They made a slogan, "Let's build a new nation by pulling togather, all united. They raised a big camphaign to eliminate illitracy, individuals became teachers of their neighbors. there endeavor was to intelectualize the whole socity. Today;

Housing, food, clothes, rice & medical services are free to all people with a population of approx. seventeen million. It is compulsory that each person get eleven yrs. of education and everyone must study one hour a day (regardless of age, or the amount of education they have) four hours on sunday, equalling one month a year, regardless of status. They have learned to make fibrous material from limestone, also to make fiber from reed, found along the ocean, and wood. They make all types of material from nylon to wool from these items. After independence they reduced taxation systamatically, until there was no taxes, and no one has private property. Korea is divided into two parts, and the U.S guards the boarders. They brought nuclear bombs into South Korea saying they will protect them from an attack from the North Korens. North Korea has begged the U.S. to stay because they are afraid the same thing will happen to them as Cambodia, (turned Soc) He said presently they have a puppet from the U.S. Govt. in power, he is Koren by birth, but CIA. Cde: Lee said Peoples Temple demonstrates internationalism, in our project he found all colors of people. He said although we come from the U.S. they do not think we are enimies. Our work has caused progress in the U.S. as well as internationally. He told us the former leader of South Korea was also a puppet of the U.S. and had his brother, as well as his conspiratorial wife killed to keep aliances with the U.S. govt., as to accuse the North Korens of attacking them when in fact it was his own guards who had killed his wife. Cde. Lee said Peoples Temple gave support to us, we never blame the U.S. people in general, the blame is on the rulers. They are not impressed with the "Carter administration". He said

"If Carter is trying to build a demagogary for himself or the country, he didn't know. He quoted Carter as saying in his election speeches that if he was elected he would withdraw from Korea. As his popularity increased, he said "He would consider withdrawing from Korea". After he was elected he said," He may withdraw from Korea. Cde. Lee pointed out that he followed that with, "and if we do withdraw, it won't be before four or five years. Lee noted that the normal stay in office for the President of the United States is only four years anyway, so theres great doubt if he plans to do anything. He also added that Carter would do it in stages. A) a little at a time, B) and the largest part would be removed in the very last stages, but that would only be theground servicemen. The Army and the Navy would stay in the interest of the U.S. companies in South Korea. He asked again that we convey sincere greeting to Cde. Jim Jones, and that we would get the biggest sucess in our endeavour to create a new socity. He asked that Marceline be kind enough to convey this to you, their feelings. He enquired about flights to J/town, Cde. Joe and Cde. Lee said they would like to go, they invited us back the next night to see a couple films on their country and production in only twenty years.

-we had to wait for quite awhile as Cde. Li 1st secretary was talking to one of the black people that are organizers in the DPRK friendship society he then saw us - he was very friendly and Cde. Jo, the second sect. came in with us also

-I told him how much we enjoyed the program - the last program of their month of solidarity against the US/ with the movie of DPRK and the speeches

-I said the movie was just lovely, it had dancing etc in it and the speeches were good such as Cde. Eximize James Edwards who talked about Guyana's need to see DPRK as a model because of the all the great things done in DPRK -he smiled a big smile and said "thank you very much"

-taiked I said that I was sorry I had mentioned the possibility of our people moving to DPRK as I we knew they had their own struggle, we had just been concerned about what might happen to children and old people if the US put too much pressure on Guyana

-told him we had a little concern about this because of the IMF loan -he didn't understand what I was saying and I had to repeat it several times

-he said that he was not at all "hurted" and that he and Cde. Jo had enjoyed the dinner very much with Mrd. Jones and us/ that it was enjoyable not only because of the political discussion but because of the social aspect of having a very frank talk and they spoke afterwards how much they had enjoyed it

-I told him about adopting babies and bringing in people for medical care here and providing all their needs for months

We were speaking to the first secretary when the Koren Ambassador intered to speak to us. He said they have been truing to locate us, they will have many things to do with us. He was gold to see us there in that they were searching for our location. The First Secretary later told us beey had herd of us in North Korea, there was an article about us. Sharon asked if it was good or bad? He said it was good. He said he did not read the atticle himself, but their infromation service provided the infromation. He asked alot of questions; basically he wanted to know the nationalities of our members, and the names of people who quardinate both here and in the United States. eg... Leaders proper name, how many koreans, blacks, whites, chinese, American Indians? Leaders Childrens names here and in the U.S., asked several times about Lew, said they would like to see him if he comes into town. He asked for directions to our home-office in G/town, said he would like to come. Sharon asked what they found interesting about us? He said they liked our involvement in humanitarian projects, and after reading and making the contact with us, it will make them more knoledgable as to how we can co-operate and work togather with them. He said they were interested in all progressive people. Sharon asked if they found it strange that a group of Americans were in Guyana living co-operatively? He agreed that they did. The Ambassador sent message to us that he regreated he was not able to spend more time with us today, but he would see us another day. They gave us quite a bit of lititure on Korea, and books written by their leader, Comrade Kim II Sung.

Conclusion; They seemed very nationalistic, I noticed rather then askeing when they could meet our leader, they were desirous of seeing Lew especially. also asked about the type of work Lew did, and Kim Yoo Ni's function on the project. They served us soft drinks and saw that Martin Amos who waswith us drank as much as he liked..took special care without Martin askeng. Lee mentioned that through the pamplet he read, there are some manouvers to do harm to our movement for the support of of the strug-les egainst the raciset in Africa. The activites of ours are enjoyable, and he was obliged to express his thanks to Jim Jones for his efforts to take care and grow up their Koren boy, he said. Lew performed so excellently and all the performances were good. Although you are whans in the past, you have gro n up and now can manage your own life on your own foot, he said" Marceline said it was a privaledge that they had come all the way from South Korea to us and that his words were touching. Lew said he had no memories of Korea, but his mom had a tendency to keep all the clippings and pictures and tact it was a time unusual for people to adopt people of any recial backgrounds, but he had been treated very well. "They eve been my mon and dad and always will be Lew said. Marceline said, well we want you to keep your Koren background. Lew said he wanted to keep his Koren background. Marceline told lee, Lew wee abon oned and his mother was loving to leave him so he could get food, she could think of nothing more painful then to not be able to feed your child. Lee said Leu's name was a Koren name. Hesaid in Koren it would be spelled ARK, pronou pronnunced Lev. He asked about Kim's husband, what did hedo? They brought out a drink that they wanted us to take, made in Korea. Sharon tolu him of our commitment to our youth and that we don't drink. It was called Insam, made from Gensin tea, it had the actual root in the bottom of the bottle. He thought it would grow in Guyana, but he didn't know if it would hold the same value in that otherscountries try to grow it and it does well, but it doesn't have the same nutrismonal value. Marceline asked about acupuncture. he aid it was used in korea, Lee asked what Marcelins older daughter was doing? Marceline told them Suzanne was in the United States and was working for the federal Govt. Lee said they had a saying in Korea..affection which comes rom growing a child is much stronger then affection that comed from giving birth, he noted that Lew and Kim were both full blooded Korens, they had many mixed Korens in his country and he could tell by looking. He asked Marceline, "It doesn't make any difference to you, does it?". Marceline said of course it did not. Hierotyce asked Lew how long he had been a muscian and what other instruments did he play. Lew told him and said he like instruments of different cultures. Lee told him of diff. instruments in Korea including ones invented in 640 A.D. Lee told of the differences of North Korea and South Korea and the propaganda told to the South Moreans..the people think all people live under one roof and eat from the same pot with the same spoon. He mentioned that they may be performing also at the culture center, putting on a art show, they have been

praised all over the world for their art. Lees aid he understood recoles Temple was striving for bociclism, some people use it for propagands, so they like to describe their form of Socialism. He said Socialism to them is a world where the welfare of the people is highly shared. Our country is not so big, almost the same as Guyana, but the population is larger. He told us of the History... History;

For thirty-six years they were under oppression, there was so much illitercy The independence accement had taken up some arms in strugele, but was not successful because of division of leadership. Not until their present leader took over did they start to become guided in the correct way. Their percent leaders father was the leader of the Foren N-tional movement, started at the age of fourteen w/ slogans of "Farm with imperlism", and from that time on became a revolutionary. He organized the anti Japense Koren Army and waged an armed struggle for fourteen years. He is presently sixty-six yrs. of age. Cde. Lee said he was told that Rev. Jim Jones sent congr. glations to the people and the leader of Korea on his birthdoto. (none of us knew anything about it, but agreed that he had). He said that two yrs. after their independence the U.S. brought fifteen countries against them. At that time there were four hundred thousand people living in the capital city of Korea, and the U.S. was responsible for four hundred thousand bombs being dropped in the city, there was not one building left standing. He caid their basic purpose was to come to Socialism then to Communism. They had a democratic revolution, then a Soc. Revolution. He said their askin civilization was so backward. They did not have naterial or finances. The Japanese tried to carry out the Koren ignorance policy and today they find they only have three engineers throughout the country. After the war they couldn't get foreign currency abroad, so the people hid to tighten their belts. They made a slogan, "Let's build a new nation by pulling together, all united. They raised a big camphaign to eliminate illitracy, incividuals become teachers of their nei libors. there endeavor was to intellectualize the whole socity. Today;

Housing, food, clothes, rice : medical services are free to all people with a population of approx. seventeen million. It is compulsory that each person get eleven yrs. of education and everyone must study one hour a day (regardless of age, or the amount of education they have) four hours on sunday, equalling one month a year, regardless of status. They have learned to make fibrous material from limestone, also to make fiber from read, found along the ocean, and wood. They make all types of m terial from nylon to wool from these items. After independence they reduced taxation systematically, until there was no taxes, and no one has private property. Korea is divided into two parts, and the U.S guards the boarders. They brought nucle r bombs into .outh Forea saying they will protect them from an attack from the North Morens. North Korea has begged the U. 3. to stay because they are afraid the same thing will happen to them as Cambodia, 'turned soc) We said presently they have a puppet from the U. T. Govt. in power, he is Koren by birth, but CI'. Edes Lee said Peoples Temple demonstrates internationalism, in our project he found all colors of people. He said although we come from the U. L. they do not think we are enimies. Our work has caused progress in the U.S. as well as internationally. He told us the former leader of South Korea was also a puppet of the U. 3. and had his brother, as well as his conspiratorial wife killed to keep aliance: with the U.S. govt., as to accuse the North Korens of attacking them when in fact it was his own guards who had killed his wife. Cde. Lee said Peoples Temple gave support to us, we never blame the 0.% people in general, the blame is on the rulers. They are not impressed with the "Carter administration". He said

"If Carter is trying to build a demagogary for himself or the country, he lidn't know. He quoted Carter as saying in his election speeches that if he u is elected he would withdraw from Korea. As his popularity increased, he said "He would consider withdrawing from Morea". After he was elected he said," He may withdraw from Morea. Cde. Lee pointed out that he followed that with, "and if we do withdraw, it won't be before four or five years. Lee noted that the normal stay in office for the President of the United States is only four years anyway, so theres great doubt if he plans to do anything. He also added that Carter would do it in stages. A) a littlesat a time, B) and the large t part would be removed whighhe very last stages, but that would only be the round servicemen. The Army and the Navy would stay in the interest of the U. . companies in South Korea. He asked again that we convey sincere greeting to Cde. Jim Jones, and that we would get the biggest success in our endeavour to create a new socity. He asked that Marceline be kind enough to convey this to you, their feelings. He enquired about flights to J/toum, Cde. Joe and Cde. Lee said they would like to go, they invited us back the next night to see a couple films on their country and production in only twenty years.

"-He went on to speak of the consistently high level of medical care, organized under a docfor who is "thorough, con-scientious and dedicated." The medical team has "the lafest in medical equipment and books," and "every person and. who goes to Jonestown is medically thoroughly examined, and charts are prepared." He recalls that he urged Dr. Schacht to start keeping daily, hourly diaries, to put the operation of the medical compound in writing, so that some of our medical schools, and the American Medical Association, can learn from what is being done at Jonestown.

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A high point of his talk related to the care of senior citizens, which he said moved him deep-ly. "All of the senior citizens" cottages are built around the immediate vicinity of the medical compound. Every single morning a member of the medical team knocks on the cottage of the senior citizen and inquires, 'Did anybody have any problem during the night? Do you have any pro-blems here this morning?' Can you imagine the security that the senior citizens feel with this kind of care? I'd like to have a representative from a body here that's trying to improve the lot of senior citizens who are left to be beggars and paupers to see what is going on in Jonestown."

He spoke of the many agricultural projects, including an improvised method of developing

The project as a whole is descritted as quite developed: a generathriving sawmill, turs to meet electrical needs. wells; streets refrigeration. The school is open-air, in a large covered area, with 15 to 20 youngsters in a class.

Teachers are drawn, in part, from "at least 50 people there who have advanced degrees." He spoke of the enthusiastic participation and discussion on the part of all the students, which is something he had not seen here, with the exception of the Oakland Community School.

Does Jonestown lack for entertainment and fun? Not at all, Garry says, "There's this beautiful auditorium, and for three-and-a-half hours I saw the most beautiful entertainment in the world. I've never. seen such talent in my life. -I saw children from toddlers through about the age of seven putting on a demonstration, with voice, and clapping, and marching, and children six and seven years old getting up and reciting poetry with meaning and gusto. It was just remarkable.

"Why are those people so happy?" he mused again. 'They are learning a new social order. They are learning an answer to a better life. When I returned to the States, I told my partners in the office that I had seen paradise. From what I saw there, I would say that the society that is being built in Jonestown is a credit to humanity."

And then, as if to reinforce the amazing description, he added, "This is not propaganda. I'm not a propagandist. I'm a hard-hitting, factualanalysis lawyer. I saw this with my own eyes. I felt it."

> The situation in Guyana is obviously very unstable right now. Things seem to be a hodg podge with no lines clearly drawn, no real government, and no alliances, beliefs or otherwise, in the community. course, you see some lines clearly drawn or know of an imminent revolutionin which case we will hold out some way until something hits the fan). However, we do not see this hardly as even a likely possibility.

We want our children to be safe and grow up in a socialist environment, with socialist education and along socialist lines. Some of our children before they came here were destroyed on drugs, but they have found a new lease on life. We came here trying to save them from anarchistic behavior, and now none of them would even think of touching a drug even if they had to that is the kind of progress we've made: But we're asking for the opportunity for our children to grow up in a socialist country.

We want to follow Marxist-Leninist creed. We are not concerned for ourselves but in providing safety and security for our people. If we were to come to the USSR to live, we would not expect to stay together as a family group, or make it a criteria to stay together in the same place. We would not be taking any stands for principles because your principles are our principles. We would be contributing in whatever small way we could to the benefit of Soviet society. Certainly we would not be demanding any material comforts either. If our people could at least stay in the USSR until a time came when they could do something to help the US. Even Jagan recently showed great concern about Guyana when he walked out of Parliament. We find that there just aren't that many people like Jim Jones in government. And we feel that such an important group like ours in terms of discipline, sensitivity and humanitarian concern, and with the medical knowledge we have, could be a benefit to the USSR. feel here like a few healthy cells on the top of a cancer.,

If there were not room for its stay in the USSR for all our people than some of our abled bodied comrades would be happy to go to Mozambique to contribute to the liberation struggles in Africa in whatever ways we could. Wherever we would go we would do an excellent job and rebuild, because we are tireless workers. If we can't be taken in and be useful someplace in a real socialist type of situation, then we would simply rather die. Why can't we be allowed to live principle lives in peace (here in Guyana)?? What are we dealing with - technocrats?

We are a very praematic people and you can be straightforward and blunt with us. We understand there is a problem verbalizing some things and so any indication at all -vevan a nod of the head - to the following question would be deeply appreciated. Hamilton Green says he is very sympathetic to us (we understand too, that Minister Green and Dr. Reid have conflict that is longstanding). Shirley Field-Ridley is supposed to be favourable to us but she is very cautious and doesn't want to stick her neck out. Some of the other ministers are just very neutral. Hoyte has apparently taken a strong stand against us, but other ministers are encouraging in saying that Hoyte will not be the next Prime Minister. We were told by officials in the U.S. Embassy that they are very fond of Hoyte and they trust him because he has a liking and a concern for the U.S.

Our only contacts with the U.S. Embassy are on business; and frequently they put up a lot of smoke but there is no fire. Quite frankly, we don't give a damm what the U.S. thinks about you visiting us. Everybody is visiting these days, and for years we have been open friends with the Soviet Union while we were in America. If we were worried about the U.S. getting angry, we would not have displayed our friendship and solidarity so openly over there so why would we worry now that we are 6000 miles away? Our support and friendship was well known: we did much legwork for the Soviet-American Friendship Society; we helped prepare various functions; we had group after group from the Soviet Union visit us; we sang "United Forever" in front of both Chinese and American officials (and have been singing this song for years), and have made no secret of our support for the Chilean refugees, including even giving one group their "bread and butter."

If there is some other reason you can not visit us — (in the future) such as that it were better for relations between Guyana and the Soviet Union - then please let us know or give us some sort of indication. We'd also like to know if Jagan is getting cooler to the USSR — as we are loyal to you. The USSR has been our "spiritual mother" for years.

We know that the Soviet Union is on a consistent path of principle. After the years of struggle and all the hell you went through in WWII with 22 million people dead and the homeland ravaged, the Soviet Union continued to consistently be on the right side of black and other liberation movements around the world. She has extended her support and shown solidarity, remaining true to the principles of proletarian internationalism. This is unlike China who has done much to improve its demestic situation but whose foreign policy is very backwards and even reactionary. In some ways she is worse than the United States because China is supposed to have socialist beliefs. Their whole posture makes us very suspicious of them.

Because members of the U.S. Congress are very supportive of us, the latest tactic the media is using is that we are friendly with the Soviet Union, and this is reflecting unfavorably on the United States. But we have always endured injustices for 28 long years now - and we will endure this also. It was our defense and support for a black activist civil rights leader, Unita Blackwell Wright, that got us involved with the reactionary element in the first place. When we took on Senator Stennis from Mississippi for harassing this progressive leader, and soon after that our problems began. This can be verified with the editor of a large daily newspaper that told us this is where the conspiracy began. Looking back, we can see that this is indeed true that our problems began with Senator Stennis, but even though we were warned, Jim Jones will never compromise principle.

In case you can not sense the urgency of our appeal, we'd like to give you some examples of the day to day realities we live with. We had a man come to long town recently and tell us there was a kidnapping planned for one of our members. He had been approached and asked to participate in the deal but had refused. It also recently had someone walk onto our property and wave a gun at some of our people. We have not made any complaints about these situations because nobody does anything anyway. But any one of these kinds of things could spark our having to take a stance to the death.
