MEDITARENIAN CLIMATES: East Coast of Black Sea, extending somewhat into ARMENIANATE Georgia toward the Caspean Sea. Some of the area has heavy rainfall, over 60 inches along the east coast area. MEMO: S/M - THE U.S.S.R - POSSIBLE SETTLEMENT LOCATIONS, GEOGRAPHY AND CLIMATE COMPILED BY: GENE CHAIKIN, WITH TOM GRUBBS AND DICK TROPP

1. General Statements and Conclusions: All available "southern" areas in the U.S.S.R. fall in latitudes equivalent to Pittsburgh on the south, Albany in the center, and Montreal on the north. In a generalized sense there are no climates which are warm the year around. However, there are some small, local areas of quite mild climate due to weather modification by local conditions, generally bodies of water or mountains. Since these areas are small the books we have on hand do not give us detailed information, so that we have had to resort to deduction and assumption.

2. Oriteria for Evaluation:
We felt that anywhere citrus crops could be grown it would not be too cold in the winters because the trees can only withstand a small amount of frost. There may be, however, winters with a lot of 45 to 55 degree weather. These we considered "first choice" areas. The next best we felt were areas where rice and cotton are grown, because they take hot summers and fairly long growing seasons. They are in semi-deserts and have cold, though dry winters (some blown snow, perhaps) as well as large diurnal temperature variations. These we considered "second choice" areas.

- 3. First Choice Areas Mediterranean Climate, citrus production: Mo. 1. The east coast of the Black Sea, south of the Caucasus Mountains. This area is partly in the Georgian SSR, and partly in the Russian Federative SSR, in the area called Krasnodar. It is a narrow costal plain that lies between the Black Sea and the Caucasus mountains. The mountains which are over 15,000', block the cold air from the north and east. The Black Sea moderates the climate. There is adequate rainfall because of proximity to the sea and convectional patterns. All varieties of semi-tropical agriculture are practiced and there is a fairly heavy population concentration.
 - No. 2. An area south of Baku, on the western side of the Caspian Sea. This area is in the Azerbaijan SSR, very near the Iranian Border. It is physically close to, and in many respects must resemble No. 1, except that it is likely somewhat drier, with lower hills.

Nos. 3&4. These are located within 300 miles or so of each other, in the foothills or the mountains that make up the northern Himalayas, in the general vicinity of the China - Pakistan - Soviet border, south and west of Lake Balkhash. They are apparently in the Uzbek SSR and the Kirgiz SSR. It is peculair to find a citrus growing area here because it is in the center of a huge continental mass, in a mountainous area, and at a latitude slightly north of Mt. Shasta. Que might expect a climate something on the order of Denver, Colorado. However, Tom speculates that these areas are in valleys that are heated by the "fauna" wind effect, which keep warm air settled in the valleys and keeps them much warmer than the surrounding hilly areas. This must be so because they could not possibly grow citrus in such a climate area. The winters would kill the trees. For instance, except for the "fauna effect" the average January temperature in this area, assuming an altitude of 2000 or less, would be 17 degrees. There appears to be a lot of agriculture in the general area, and a lot of oil nearby, so the area is substantially developed. Cities that may be in these areas (the agricultural maps do not have any political geography and cannot be superimposed) are Andizhan, Samarkand or Dushanbe. There is a large Russian Slavic population mixed with the Turcic peoples who are indigenous to the region. Interestingly, the language map for the region shows these mixtures, plus such languages in isolated areas as Iranian, Gypsy, and Korean.

- 4. Second Choice Areas "Southern" Continental Climate, rice and cotton production: These are two areas, quite similar, which follow the river beds of the two main rivers that frow from the mountains in the south, generally north and empty into the Sea of Aral. They are the Syr river, located in the Kazakh SSR, and the Amu river, located in the Uzbek SSR. They are areas that are mainly devoted to the raising of cotton and rice on huge irrigated collective farms. There are now many Russian Slavs there, as well as the indigenous Turcic peoples. The area has been developed mostly in the last 20 years and is still very new. The crops require a fairly long, and hot growing season - the Bakersfield area is a good illustration, though the latitude of the area under discussion is more like that of Redding, Cal. The climate is continental, but quite dry in most of the area, around 10" per year. Most of the precipitations is in the winter - which means snow. We suspect an average January temperature of 20 degrees, and an average July temperature of 80 degrees. It is likely quite windy, which would add to a chill factor with the winter cold. This would appear to be a fairly rigorous climate for our people, both as to summer heat and winter cold. On the other hand, it is dry which is very healthy and makes both temperature extreems easier to take.
- 5. Other Choices: The best of the rest seem to have a latitude and climate not unlike Minneapolis, Minn. or colder. Perhaps the areas of Moldavia or the southern most and westernmost portions of the Ukranian SSR, right near the Black Sea might be more mild. This area is too small to get any information about in our literature. We rather expect, however, that it is an area of warm summers, excellent soils and a good growings season but a cold and snowy winter changing to, perhaps, a cold and foggy winter on the soast. These areas in the southwest must also be very populated. The Moldavian SSR has the largest average per square mile population of any of the Republics, which may only mean that there is little waste land in the area.

6. Political Evaluation:

It appears less likely that they would be interested in putting us in highly populated, well developed areas near strategic borders, such as Nos. 1, 2, and the southwest, though No. 1 would appear the best for us. However, they have permitted the settlement in the nearby Armenian SSR of some 200,000 non-Soviet Armenians in the last 20 years. Unfortunately, these "preferred" living areas present the appearance of fairly large population concentrations and full use of the available farm land. We feel, therefor, for both political and demographic reasons that the Soviets would rather have us in a new "pioneering" area - which means Nos. 3 & 4, or the "second choice" areas.

7. Conclusion:

We suggest that the Soviets may not understand our needs for, or rather our standards of a "warm" climate. Our literature is very generalized and we are not able to get good descriptions of small areas. We strongly suggest that a party of our people go to any of the areas suggested by the Soviets, during the winter, to make a first hand inspections of the conditions and an evaluation of their suitability for our people.

Re: Moving Publications

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We received a message when Sandy got back to include in the *mas mailer a note saying that after that time all mail will be coming from and going to our Jonestown headquarters. This has raised some questions we would like to get clarification on.

Has consideration been given to using Miami as a mail sending and receiving point? Chaikin told me that theft was a big problem with international mail, and quite a few of our people do send cash. Also there is no reduced rate for non-profit organizations in international postal regulations. It's going to cost a small fortune to mail form Guyana our regular monthly mailers, at 30¢ per ½ ounce. Figuring 15,000 peices of mail that comes to \$4500. We can mail in Miami at our non-profit rate of\$.021 per piece; at 15,000 pieces that comes to \$315.

Figuring air freight rates at .85¢ per lb., and an average weight of 800 lbs. of mail, that would make an additional \$680.00. We coild arrange a special call service at the Post Office where we could pick up mail twice a month and they would hold it for us until then. BWIA lists round trip fares from Miami to Georgetown at\$456. There may be something cheaper elsewhere.

There may be some other complications we haven't included, such as--how long would overseas delivery take? But it sure looks a lot cheaper to go out of Miami. GG - I - D

PROPOSED SCHEDULE

January is a good month in the mail. It would be good to have a mailer to cover that month before we leave. February and March have been typically low months in the mail ever since I've been working with it.

A logical time to move then would be during that period of time (Jan.-Mar.) after the January mailer had been sent. That would give us 3 months to move and get set up again, and have time to get out a mailer for Easter. That should be enough time if things can be sorked out in Georgetown.

That leaves November and December for you to work it out there: Is that feasible?

SHIPPING PROCEDURE

One of the major questions is whether adequate storage facilities

have been arranged for the paper and equipment in Georgetown. There has
been little communication about this, so here is some background into on
what we need:

1) Humidity-controlled atmosphere

High humidity has several detrimental effects on materials we use. Paper absorbs moisture and warps, often to the degree it cannot run through a press. Film in excessive moisture, develops fungus that attacks the emulsion and destroys it. High moisture also causes trouble with inkdrying on paper, and performance of paper in the operation of the press and bindery equipment. The problem can be alleviated by the use of air conditioners or dehumidifiers. the relative humidity of the air (% of moisture present per degree of Temp.) should be around 50-55%. When it gets over that, troubles start. Therefore, a building will not only have to be dry as far as protection from rain, but have climate control inside for maintaining that 55% humidity level.

We could easily use 7000 sq. ft. of floor space with half of that space under the humidity control mentioned above. That accounts for paper storage, typewriter shop, and expanded camera facilities for a

photo-lab. We found out in SF that we can cram into a lot less space than we thought, so we will certainly work with whatever is available. The 7000 sq. ft. figure allows for room to set up all equipment with good working clearances and storage space. We may want to plan for more space for expanded operations. There are many skills and services in the field of graphic arts, printing, and photography that we could offer commercially, and we ought to leave room to grow.

2) Government clearances

- Do we have proper clearance from Guyana customs to bring in the equipment and related supplies like paper? If not, what do we need to do to get it? We could suffer a lot of damage to the cargo, if it has to sit on the dock for months while we straighten out the paper-work.
- Is there going to be a limit on the amount of paper we can bring in other than what we can afford to ship, such as imposed by Import Regulations, etc? What kind of paper requirements do you have there now or anticipate for school or administrative use?

Can we apply for an import license now, so that we will be able to establish a means to restock our basic supplies such as paper, film, chemicals and plates?

I would recommend not moving this department until the arrangements with customs and adequate storage have been taken care of. There is a lot of money invested in equipment and paper, that could easily be lost by poor planning. there may be other considerations that I am not aware of, but they ought to be carefully weighed against the losses we could have it we do move before these arrangements have been made.

We are planning to ship all of the publications equipment and paper in containers. These are big 20' boxes something like our freezers out back. They offer several advantages. One: They are waterproof, so we

won't have to worry about crates leaking. two: they afford much better protection against damages in handling. This is very important as the presses, and much of our other machinery may be completely destroyed if handled separately, in crates. We load and unload the containers, and they are picked up by heavy cranes directly onto the ship.

‡At the moment the longshoremen are on strike against container freight lines. They will not load the ships unless they first unload the container then load it again. There are ways around this, according to our freight forwarder, but he suggested we wait until we are ready to ship and see if the strike hasn't been settled yet. He expects container ratesto go up but is not sure hwo much. At the moment they are the same as for other cargo plus a special \$3.00 per ton charge. Containers can be purchased used for \$1500.00, they can be rented from companies that own them, or we can pay the shipping line to use theirs. The last method seems best, because we are ownly paying for their use as far as the freight to get the empty container back to a US port.

EQUIPMENT PURCHASES FOR CLEARANCE

There are two pieces of equipement we need to replace before we leave, obth are essential to the operation. We plan on financing their purchase through the sale of several other pieces of equipment we now have that we aren't using like the roll converter for our big press and the paper stock we have for it. With the value of those items and the trade-ins from the old equipment we should have the amount we need to purchase the two items below.

a. Paper Cutter - \$4500.00 - we want to replace our present cutter with a larger model that can handle bigger sheets of paper and larger loads. The one we now have is not designed to do the kind of work we are presently doing in the way of cutting down larger sheet sizes to fit our presses, and trimming finished press sheets for finishing operations with accuracy. As a result we have all our paper cut for us by someone else if it has to be accurate. Over seas we will have to deal more in larger sheets of parent stock and be cutting them to size. We can save ourselves the cutting costs by having our own cutter capable of doing th job. The price quoted here is for a good used cutter.

b.Camera Lights - \$2000.00- the camera lights we have on our process camera are about 20 years old and worn out. The transformer smokes during heavy use. We would like to replace this system with one that operates on pulsed xenon, an arrangement that does not require light bulbs like the one we have now. The bulbs are a special order and will be very delicate to ship. The camera lights are essential to the operation of the camera, which makes all our negatives for the printing process. We have put off doing anything about them as with the cutter, because of theirmediate availability of replacement here. Overseas this won't be possible, so we feel it is important to take care of these two things now.

FILM PROCESSING EQUIPMENT FOR CLEARANCE

Commercial film processing and printing of color pictures in volume requires a heavy capital investment. Most places here that do this kind of work have chain stores all over the bay and use one central processing plant to do the work for all of them The major reason being that film processors require minimum loads of film, in thearea of 40 rolls a day to maintain accurate color balance. Without that volume you end up with bad pictures. A volume processor will handle only one kind of film at a time, so you can't nun different films through it to make up the volume. There are different chemicals involved in the 3 major film processes for Kodak films and they require different chemicals and conditions. Changing a processor over from one set to the other is not practical because of the expense involved in flushing the chemicals and replacing them.

We could get started in this business on a smaller scale at considerably less expense. The equipment listed here is oort of a medium step. It will provide the necessary control to do color work, and be able to handle enough volume to get started in commercial work. We will be doing strictly manual processing of film and custom printing (of pictures), substituting labor for more mechanized equipment. We may not be able to do a lot of work, but what we do we could do well and with that I think we could build the kind of reputation that would build business to the point where we might be able to use more automated equipment and make it pay.

We are equipped now to do black and white film and prints in small amounts. Color requires a much greater degree of control in the processing and a different head for the enlarger. The following equipment would provide us with the basics of what we would need to get started.

- 1) Temperature controlled Developing Sink- \$2200.00. This unit will be control source for maintaining the proper temperatures for developing films and prints. It heats of chills the incoming water source to the degree required and recirculates the water in a continous bath to within a tolerance of ½ a degree, the required amount for many of the developing stages.
- 2) Basket processor- \$250.00. This is an inexpensive processor that is operated manually but allows for 14 8x10 prints to be processed at one time rather than doing one at a time in trays. The baskets can be replaced with others to do different types of processes, such as from black & white to color.
- 3) Beseler Dichroic Colorhead \$550.00 This unit attaches to our present enlarger to give it the capacity to do color prints.
 - 4) Beseler PM-2 color analyzer \$339.00 This instrument is used with the enlarger to analyze the proper exposure time for a given negative by measuring the density of the primary colors. It eliminated the hit and miss method we use now, and which would be extremely costly for any volume of prints. Again this is an inexpensive unit compared to the computer controlled, \$35,000. analyzers used by commercial color labs, but it will do the job as long as the operator knows what he is doing.
- 5) Patterson Print Washer- \$115. This washer can handle a lot of prints at one time and keep them separated so that they all are washed clean of chemicals, an essential operation, or the finished prints develop spots on them.

COLOR SEPARATION EQUIPMENT

To print a color picture on an offset press requires a set of color separation negatives. In other words, the original image is broken down into the proper proportions of the primary colors which when printed in sequence produce a finished reproduction in full color. We have been experimenting with this process on our camera for the past few months. Much to the amazement of the Kodak technical representative we have been able to come up with some reasonable sets of negatives which we have used in our mailers. The process is a very technical one and like the reproduction of color in the photography, requires exact control of processing chemicals and exposure times in order to get accurate results.

Since the introduction of offset printing, letterpress operations have become obsolete in many areas, and the requirements for color separations hax for trade color presses has grown tremendously. Enough so that a lot of research and money has been spent on developing equipment to make these separations by machine and minimize the operator's time and skill involved. Laser operated color scanners and computer controlled enlargers have been developed to do this at a cost of nearly a quarter million dollars for a unit.

There is market for color separations wherever there are printers. I'm sure that in Guyana, especially there are few if any companies who do this kind of work. It is certainly a product with excellent potential for export to other Caribbean nations where the tourist market fex generates a lot of color advertising material.

We have a process camera that is capable of making separations. The temperature controlled sink unit proposed for film-processing could also xxx supply the needed control for processing this kind of color film. Like color printing, the key to making good separations is being able to calculate the proper exposure for each of the different color negatives. The instrument used to do this is called a densitometer and it measures the densities of the original piece of to be reproduced and the transmitted

density of the finished negative to check its accuracy. Without this instrument we resort to the hit-and-miss mehtod which is even more time-consuming in this process than in photography.

Again, a densitometer will not give us the instant ability to produce color separations in massive quantities. Instead, it will provide the necessary element of control needed to use our existing equipment effectively enough to do the work commercially on a smaller scale. I think this type of work has tremendous potential in South America and would be worth the investment in the equipment listed below to get started in it.

- 1) Reflection-Transmission Densitometer \$2200.00
- 2) Contact Rrinkingxk Point Source Lamp \$250.00

To help finance equipment purchases for photo-processing and color separation equipment, I would recommend we sell our IBM memory typewriter that is used in the Letter's Office to answer our mail. this machine, which we own, is constantly requiring service, which though available here, is not available without considerable expense in Georgetown. Also it is too complicated for Brian to work on. Moving it to Guyana would be courting disaster, I think.

Laurie Efrien and Cathy Richardson both insist they can't get along without the machine. They have a point, when the mail is coming in heavily it is a big job to individually type or write a response to each letter.

The mail volume has been way down the past few months and I think with the people we have there in Guyana we could easily handle that mail without the machine. It seems inevitable from the number of times the thing breaks down, that we will be doing just that anyway, while we are waiting for it to be repaired out of Caracas, Venezuela.

I don't want to devalue the machine or its uses completely. It has been very useful for doing small quantity form letters with the quality look of an original letter. It is possible it could have some commercial

uses in Guyana. However, it is not practical as far as being able to maintain it is concerned, and without that the (maintenance) the machine is worthless to us.

The only way to get around this is to look into leasing a new machine that will do a similar job. In this way we would pay a certain amount to use the machine with service for the unit included in the contract. We can also find a company that might have better service connections in Georgetown than IBM. We are looking around now, talking to various/dealers about this, so that when we get to Georgetown, we can make a decision.

g We face the same type of problem with our composer that sets type.

But it manages to stay in pretty good shape, we don't have many service calls on it. And there is a chance Brian could work on it, as it is not so complicated.

There is a possibility we might be able to locate a unit that would accomplish both goals, both set type and be able to store codes in memory for use in typing form letters. We'll see.

You might check with Laura Johnson, Tim Carter, and Ruth Tupper who all worked in the letters office and might have some opinion on the matter. If it is agreed to sell the machine I suggest we wait until the last minute to do it, in order to defuse any problems with Laurie and Cathy. They both a agree that that particular machine should not go overseas, but they want to see it replaced before we go. I've told them that it is a decision that should probably be made after we get to Georgetown and have had a chance to check things out there, but they are pretty set on having a machine to answer the mail. both have been at each other's throats lately, also.

Anyway, if we sell the memory typewriter we will have: the additional funds from it, which IBM suggests as \$3000, the active market value at the moment, to use for other equipment.

On November 5, 1978, a group of us went to a conference at the Jack Tar Hotel sponsored by the American Russian Institute/Holland Roberts Center Jean Brown, Andy and myself approached the Consul General, Alex I. Zinchunk, Jean Brown delivered to Mr. Zinchunck your message as instructed. Zinchunk had received considerable information about Peoples Temple and his comments were, "I understand that your group has been quite active". The more Jean spoke the more he nodded and stated, yes, I know, I know. It seems that Davidow and Bransford or whomever, has been doing a lot of talking about P.T. Davidow mentioned to me that it won't be long now before some of from P.T. will be going to the U.S.S.R.

On the morning of 11/5, Hue Fortson was a featured speaker in Oakland at slides. The members of this this humanist fellowship church. Hue took church are affiliated with the Holland Roberts Institute, through Andy, P.T. was invited to this church to explain to the membership what P.T. was all about, both here and in Guyana. There was some question and answers but because the slides took up so much of the time, the questions were minimal. However, one man approached HUE and inquired about the between Jonestown, Burhham, Chagen . He went on to say that he spent some time in Guyana mining Diamonds but ran out of money so he returned to the U.S. By in large through, I think the impression that was left with the small group was positive. One lady asked about the monetary system in Jonestown. monetary exchange Hue explained that folks had money but there was no neressary due to the collective lifestyle. She talked about slave labor camps. I do think though, that the slides told the complete story about Jonestown.

According to the minister of this church the congregation was a mixture of old leftists, union members, socialists and communists. He considered himself a communist. He wanted to know what our affiliation was with Glide, and it seems like I here that question a lot. I told him none. He then elaborated about Cecil Williams which was quite unfavorable.

On Thursday November 9, 1978 a group of us will go to Sproul Hall to hear Angela Davis speak.

Last Friday, Oct. 31, 1978 HUE, GUY, AnDY and MYSELF went to a fundraiser for Yvonne Burke, who is running for Atty. General of California. Yvonne did not show nor did Dymally, but Andrew Young did show. We talked with him twice. Once was very brief, too many folks around. On the second attempt, Hue asked for his autograph while I talked in his ear. I told him:about the project and the reputation it is receiving from visitors around the world and that as UN.ambassador he should see the project for himself. He promised that whenever he was in the carribean, specifically, Guyana, he would drop in on the project. He said he would like to see it.

Andrew Young's speech was somber, dismaly and an attack on the black middle class. He talked about the systematic oppression of minorities and the systematic exclusion of minorities from the mainstream of economic, political life. He spoke about conservatism and the move towards racism as oppose to one world government.

while I was speaking to Andrew Young, a woman over heard my comments about Jonestown, and later asked to speak with us about the project. It seems as though this woman had been to Guyana and was familiar with the land lease program of Prime Minister Burhham. She spoke of a group who presently reside in the bush, originally from the U.S., who received mail from sourounding villagers and citizens of Georgetown who want to know what is happening in Jonestown.

According to this women, who's name I will have to forward later, she has been sending copies of articles clipped from papers here in America. We invited here to the church to see the slides. She was eager to come, she did say that she wasn't guarantseing what she would be convinced by what we had to say to her.

Justice Clinton White. I had previously met Clinton White at a correttional seminar and he was friendly. He said he knew little about P.T. other than what he had been told by Billy Hunter and read in the newspaper. He did say that he had heard that J.J. was a very good man. We ran into Justice White on 10/31 approx. 2/3 weeks after the first encounter and he had been approached by Stoen. He brought up the child situation, we explained the child situation. He seemed reluctant to listen but he listened.

We told him about Stoen's activities in Germany and his conduct as an atty. representing clients against a church to which he was once atty. Justice White was defensive of Stoen's behavior in Germany and summarized such activity as something he would have done in his youth. He said he would talk with Goodlett and Gary, but wouldn't promise to read : the literature.

I called Dymally's office in Sac., from work, to obtain precinct information for S.F. and this area is doing literally nothing in support of the Lt. Gov. I mentioned that I was from P.T. and the response I received was that the Sac. office was very impressed with the amount of support P.T. — has given the Lt. Gov throughout the year.

On Thurs. evening Perry will be at the Temple for dinner. I understand from Andy's report, See Attached, that he has been cleared to visit Jonestown. A report will follow his visit.



The situation in Guyana is obviously very unstable right now. Things seem to be a hodge-podge with no lines clearly drawn, no real government, and no alliances -beliefs or otherwise - in the community. (Unless, of course, you see some lines clearly drawn or know of an imminent revolution - in which case we will hold out some way until something hits the fan.) However, we do not see this as hardly even a likely possibility.

We want our children to be safe and grow up in a socialist environment, with socialist education and along socialist lines. Some of our children before they came here were destroyed on drugs, but they have found a new lease on life. We came here trying to save them from anarchistic behavior, and now none of them would even think of touching a drug even if they had to - that is the kind of progress we've made. But we are asking for the opportunity for our children to grow up in a socialist country.

We want to follow Marxist-Leninist creed. We are not concerned for ourselves, but in providing safety and security for our people. If we were to come to the USSR to live, we would not expect to stay together as a family group, or make it a criteria to stay together in the same place. Although if it were decided to do that we could be a model of how principled people live. We would be very happy to assimilate and blend into society. We would not be taking any stands when to it comes to this - we would be contributing in whatever small way we could to the benefit of Soviet society. Certainly we would not be demanding any material comforts either.

If there were not room to stay in the USSR for all our people then some of our abled bodied comrades would be happy to go to Mozambique to contribute to the liberation struggles in Africa in whatever ways we could. Wherever we would go we would do an excellent job and rebuild, because we are tireless workers. If we can't be taken in and be useful someplace in a real socialist type of situation, then we would simply rather die. Why can't we be allowed to live principle lives in peace (here in Guyana)? What are we dealing with - technocrats?

We are a very pragmatic people and you can be straightforward and blunt with us. We understand there is a problem verbalizing some things and so any indication at all -even a nod of the head- to the following question would be deeply appreciated. Have Burnham and Jagan come to some sort of agreement, or is there something in the wind in that respect? Of course this will be kept in absolute confidence. It is very important for us to know this - and if you dont want to talk to us or give us some sort of indication, then please go directly to Jim Jones and let him know personally. We know that the PPP and the PNC show strong interest in their own party's, but if there is a move to the right, and we are told to stay away from Jagan, then that situation is totally unacceptable to us (because Jagan is a friend of the Soviet Un ion and we are loyal to the Soviet Union). Then again, if Guyana is becoming more friendly with the Soviet Union and is trying to keep us from precipitating any problems, then we understand. But it is vitally important to the wellbeing of our entire family that we know this.

We know that there are people in the cabinet who are very sympathetic to us. Hubert Jack is one of them, and we were told that he has the current favor to become the next Prime Minister. Hamilton Green says he is very sympathetic to us (we understand, too, that Minister Green and Dr. Reid have conflict that is longstanding). Shirley Field-Ridley is supposed to be favourable to us but she is very cautious and doesn't want tostick her neck out. Some of the other ministers are just very neutral. Hoyte has apparantly taken a strong stand against us, but other ministers are encouraging in saying that Hoyte will not be the next Prime Minister. We were told by officials in the U.S. Embassy that they are very fond of Hoyte and they trust him because he has a liking and a concern for the U.S.

Our only contacts with the U.S. Embassy are on one business, and frequently they put up alot of smoke but there is no fire. Quite frankly, we don't give a damn what the U.S. thinks about you visiting us. Everybody is visiting us these days, and for years we have been open friends with the Soviet Union while we were in America. If we were worried about the U.S. getting angry, we would not have displayed pur friendship and solidarity so openly over there — so why would we worry now that we are 6000 miles away? Our support and friendship was well known: we did much legwork for the Soviet-American friendship society, we helped prepare various functions, we had group after group from the Soviet Union visit us, we sang "United Forever" in front of both Chinese and American officials (and have been singing this song for years), and have made no secret of our support for the Chilean refugees, including even giving one group their "bread and butter."

If there is some other reason you can not visit us - such as that it were better for relations between Guyana and the Soviet Union - then please let us know or give us some sort of indication. We'd also like to know if Jagan is getting cooler to the USSR - as we are loyal to you. The USSR has been our "spiritual mother" for years.

We know the Soviet Union is on a consistent path of principle, even though we were visited by some comrades from the USSR who displayed male chanvinism and too much concern for jewelry and material things. But we understand that this is only a phase. Some people may feel hey need this sort of thing after the years of struggle and all the hell you went through in WWII with 22 million people dead and the homeland ravaged, The important thing is that the Soviet Union consistently been on the right side of black and other liberation movements around the world, and have extended their support and shown solidarity, remaining true to the principles of proletarian internationalism. This is unlike China who has done much to improve its domestic situation but whose foreign effects policy is very backwards and even reactionary. In some ways she is worse than the United States because China is supposed to have socialistic beliefs. Their whole posture makes us very suspicious of them.

Because members of the U.S. Congress are very supportive of us, the latest tactic the media is using is that we are friendly with the Soviet Union and this is reflecting unfavorably on the United States. But we have always endured injustices — for 28 long years now — and we will endure this also. It was our defense and support for a black activist civil rights leader, Unita Blackwell Wright, that got us involved with the reactionary element in the first place. We took on Senator Stennis from Mississippi for harassing this progressive leader, and soon after our problems began. This can be verified with the editor of a large daily newspaper that told us this is where the conspiracy began. Looking back, we can see that this is indeed true that our problems began with Senator Stennis, but even though we were warned Jim Jones will never compromise principle, we can see that the second compromise principle, we can see that the second component of the second

In case you can not sense the urgency of our appeal, we'd like to give you some example s of the day to day realities we live with. We had a man come to Jonestown recently and tell us there was a kidnapping planned for one of our members. He had been approached and asked to participate in the deal but had refused. We also recently had someone walk onto our property and wave a gun at some of our people. We have not made any complaints about these situations because nobody does anything anyway. But any one of these kinds of things could spark our having to take a stance to the death.





FIVE TERRITORIES

1. THE BAHAMAS:

- (a) The question of resources their acquisition and stewardship must be of paramount concern to the Church in the Caribbean.
- (b) The CCC should be careful not to create a cleavage between the spiritual and material concerns of men.
- (c) The need to effect a more adequate means of communication between the CCC and its members, and between the Church leaders and their constituencies was very firmly stressed.
- (d) The question of the Role of the Church in a Socialist Society needed to be fully explored, so that Member-Churches could be given ample guidance.
- (e) Population explosion and its relationship to Caribbean poverty will have to be tackled at various levels, since the region can no longer afford to ignore such a situation.
- (f) Young people need the ministry of the Church in a far more dynamic way than has so far been afforded them - education, vocational training, simple cathechetics, remedial action.
- (g) Caribbean Independence must be fully affirmed.

2. CURACAO:

- (a) The Curacao Seminar dealt mainly with the question of Worship, and agreed that the close connection between liturgy and life had to be as erted in the witness of the Church.
- (b) Liturgical change was needed in the Church, if it was to reflect the culture and aspirations of the people in a more meaningful way.
- I (c) Church buildings should be used for purposes other than worship such a measure could promote learning experiences for the true meaning of Christian worship and its relevance in the wider society.



The Peoples Temple, an organization of many thousands, is a multi-racial effort which has been instrumental in bringing large numbers of people out of poverty, crime, addictions, and many other problems created by oppressive social conditions. One thousand members of our organization are presently in Guyana, together with our leader, Jim Jones, working alongside the Guyanese government in their progressive efforts to feed, clothe, and house the nation. Our people have entered into this project with diligent enthusiasm, rapidly developing every type of skill which will best serve the needs of the Guyanese, and the self-sufficiency of the project.

People of every age, even the elderly with very limited means, have been welcomed to the project. There is an excellent school for the children which has received high praise from the Ministry of Education in Guyana; and everyone from infants to the oldest have all their needs planned for and met, including expert medical attention. We are privileged to be able to set up clinics and health care education programs in the areas surrounding the project, for Amerindian and other peoples who for the first time have close access to complete medical facilities. Our contributions in tropical agriculture include many vegetable protein foods needed in the area and not previously cultivated, some of which were thought unsuitable to jungle cultivation before the project found successful growing methods.

We hope you will find the enclosed material of some interest, and we invite any type of inquiry or communication which will help broaden our goals and perspective. Our greatest aspiration is of course for world peace, and to further any efforts which will relate to the pressing needs of many millions of the world's peoples who still suffer substandard conditions of life.

We greet you in peace and friendship, with the hope foremost in our hearts for the easing of world tensions in the year 1978.
