I was a member of the four man technical team dispatched to Georgetown, Guyana, to assist in the investigation of the murder of Congressman Leo J. Ryan. (u)

On Saturday, December 2, 1978, [redacted] of the Guyana Police Photographic Laboratory and [redacted] police department photographer, made available to me their 35mm black and white negatives of the Port Kaituma airstrip and Jonestown crime scenes. With the assistance of [redacted] and using the Guyanese facilities, I printed three photographic copies of each exposure. Upon completion of those I was furnished a roll of 120 size black and white negatives of the scene at Lamaha Gardens in Georgetown, Guyana. This was the location at which Sharon Amos and her three children were murdered. I printed three copies of each of these negatives and then returned all of the original negatives to [redacted] and [redacted] (u)

On December 5th, [REDACTED], Guyana Police Photographer provided me with 16 rolls of 35mm black and white negatives for the purpose of printing. He identified these films as having been recovered from the body of a newsmen killed at the Port Kaituma airstrip. After these were printed the negatives were returned to Cecil A. Roberts, Assistant Commissioner In Charge of Criminal Investigative Division, Police of Guyana on December 11th. *1/21*

On December 6th the Technical team was transported to Port Kaituma and Jonestown by two U.S. Army helicopters. At Port Kaituma we conducted a crime scene search and I photographed bullet holes and physical damage done to the twin otter Guyanese airplane which at this time was being repaired. At Jonestown I took aerial photographs as well as overall scenes.
