I went through the Almanac, and there were so many countries I never even heard of, tried to piece together their politics from the assortment of info. given and terminology used; then double-checked against the "People's Almanac", which includes notes on "Who REALLY rules" whatever country. The ones I wasn't sure of I held up for the moment to check further.

Note: We revised the letterhead and re-printed it, deleting Disciples of Christ and the Bible quote. Printed enough to keep on hand for future projects. Also reprinting mailing envelopes, and "Update: Jonestown" with same deletions (will mail *pages* when countries sent to: that's ready).

MEETING WITH NORTH KOREANS (SHARON AND DEBBIE) "Democratic People's Republic
17/3/78 of Korea"

- we just dropped by to bring them some literature because Terri Carter and I had walked by one day and the 2nd Sect. Jo was amazed at her having a Korean child and we had talked to him about our project briefly and told them we'd bring some literature but they were completely agreeable and we just had a chance to get by the socio-economic issues, and not enough on spiritual re-
- they said they had been looking for us and trying to get hold of us/ they took us in their greeting room and served us orange sodas and were very hospitable and the Ambassador in June's expense was a great success and told us that they were anxious to work together with the reign of fear under
- we also met the 1st Secretary of the PC and the 2nd Secretary of the PC (at long length) (the total score of the had secretary is in 1978) he
- Li San Il an asked a lot of questions/ about the organizational structure of PT, if JJ was a Reverend, what was his title (we said he was our leader and explained that he is a Reverend but the purpose of the church in the US was to bring people out of religion into more socialistic principles)
- he said in his country religion is not forbidden but is mostly the Eastern type religions with some Christian the - particularly from the ex-British
- he particularly liked the idea of the religious groups and wanted especially to know about the religious groups he told him we had adopted 3 Korean children and explained how a drunken driver had killed one child, about Lou and he asked about the third Suzanne (we only gave him a sketchy info about Suzanne, how she worked in the US etc) - we told him about Kim U Mai and he asked about what she did in Guyana and about Grace Pereira, since it was
- they want to meet Lou with the ocean into the Virgin Islands, and since it
- they wanted to know what kind of work they were doing and what Terri Carter does
- they asked about the situation of the USSR and the number of members there and in Jonestown be at a very low ebb, and stood in need of being strengthened
- they said they knew about it because there was some positive article about it in North Korea and they had been sent a report about us, I asked if we could see the article (but that's when Sharon said they had only heard of it in the morning)
- they said they'd like to drop by our house here in Georgetown, we gave them some literature and said we'd drop by some more
- I asked them about the relations with USSR and other socialist countries/ they said they have good relations with all the socialist countries and 3rd world countries including China USSR and Guyana
- they said they are totally industrialized
- they wanted to know how we purchased our goods (people in Jonestown have no money we explained that goods are purchased in Georgetown and distributed as people have need thru a warehouse) EDUCATIONAL PATTERNS
- I told them we have been described as a very special form of socialism by the vet who's visited many - a charity of the world in a good article about us was written in the USSR papers/ we described the work done in the US for people like people (Chileans, South Africans etc) and how Angela Davis wrote to President Carter on our behalf
- they gave us a folder of the book heading of "Reconciliation", the Seminar in
- I asked if they encouraged immigration to North Korea and he said at this time they don't / I asked if they have students from other countries studying there and he said that at the moment there are only 12 arrangements between govts.
- he wanted to know if the US government had arranged our movement to Guyana (in other words, was there an arrangement between the US gov't and the Guyanese gov't and he explained that it was an arrangement with us and Guyana but of course the US was not aware of what we were doing.

"OPERATION OUTREACH"

SUMMARY NOTES

from

FIVE TERRITORIES

1. THE BAHAMAS:

- (a) The question of resources - their acquisition and stewardship - must be of paramount concern to the Church in the Caribbean.
- (b) The CCC should be careful not to create a cleavage between the spiritual and material concerns of men.
- (c) The need to effect a more adequate means of communication between the CCC and its members, and between the Church leaders and their constituencies was very firmly stressed.
- (d) The question of the Role of the Church in a Socialist Society needed to be fully explored, so that Member-Churches could be given ample guidance.
- (e) Population explosion and its relationship to Caribbean poverty will have to be tackled at various levels, since the region can no longer afford to ignore such a situation.
- (f) Young people need the ministry of the Church in a far more dynamic way than has so far been afforded them - education, vocational training, simple catechetics, remedial action.
- (g) Caribbean Independence must be fully affirmed.

2. CURACAO:

- (a) The Curacao Seminar dealt mainly with the question of Worship, and agreed that the close connection between liturgy and life had to be asserted in the witness of the Church.
- (b) Liturgical change was needed in the Church, if it was to reflect the culture and aspirations of the people in a more meaningful way.
- (c) Church buildings should be used for purposes other than worship - such a measure could promote learning experiences for the true meaning of Christian worship and its relevance in the wider society.

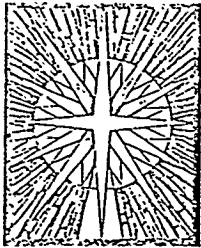

Dear President Tito:

We extend cordial greetings to you, the government and people of the Socialist Federation of Yugoslavia, from the Peoples Temple in the United States and Guyana, South America. We would like to share the enclosed information with you to introduce you to the thriving pioneer agricultural project the Peoples Temple is undertaking in the North West District of Guyana, and to express to you our aspirations to enhance technology for food production in the interior jungle regions of developing nations.

The Peoples Temple, an organization of many thousands, is a multi-racial effort which has been instrumental in bringing large numbers of people out of poverty, crime, addictions, and many other problems created by oppressive social conditions. One thousand members of our organization are presently in Guyana, together with our leader, Jim Jones, working alongside the Guyanese government in their progressive efforts to feed, clothe, and house the nation. Our people have entered into this project with diligent enthusiasm, rapidly developing every type of skill which will best serve the needs of the Guyanese, and the self-sufficiency of the project.

People of every age, even the elderly with very limited means, have been welcomed to the project. There is an excellent school for the children which has received high praise from the Ministry of Education in Guyana; and everyone from infants to the oldest have all their needs planned for and met, including expert medical attention. We are privileged to be able to set up clinics and health care education programs in the areas surrounding the project, for Amerindian and other peoples who for the first time have close access to complete medical facilities. Our contributions in tropical agriculture include many vegetable protein foods needed in the area and not previously cultivated, some of which were thought unsuitable to jungle cultivation before the project found successful growing methods.

We hope you will find the enclosed material of some interest, and we invite any type of inquiry or communication which will help broaden our goals and perspective. Our greatest aspiration is of course for world peace, and to further any efforts which will relate to the pressing needs of many millions of the world's peoples who still suffer substandard conditions of life.

We greet you in peace and friendship, with the hope foremost in our hearts for the easing of world tensions in the year 1978.

Answers to farming project inquiries from Don Beck:

- Ivory Coast - Africa- letter was forwarded to that government by Mathieu Capet; First Secretary, Washington, D.C.
- United Arab Republics - advised us to direct inquiries to Ministry of Immigration & Naturalization P.O. Bx 228 Abu Dhabi. United Arab Emirates
- Finland - recommended inquiry go to Farming Administration Maatilahallitus Mariankatu 23 00170 Helsinki 17 Finland.
- Canada - a letter generally discouraging of the possibilities of settlement, and some lit. describing what territories were available for settlement and addresses to send to various provinces for more info. Said homesteading is virtually non-existent.
- North Korea - answer from Dept. of State informing us that U.S. has no diplomatic relations with that country and Korean society is very austere. therefore undesirable to live in.
- Switzerland - pointed out that farming land is very scarce there, being mostly mountains & water. Also mentioned severe restrictions to illegal aliens. Provided lit. pertaining to aliens & acquisition of property.
- Italy - letter to inform me that my letter had been forwarded to the Italian Consulate General in S.F.
- Malawi- directed us to send inquiries to The Secretary for Agriculture & Natural Resources, P.O. Box 30134, Lilongwe 3 Republic of Malawi.
- Greece - advised us to direct inquiries to Ministry of Agriculture, General Directorate of Agric., 2 Aharnon St., Athens, Greece and to the American-Hellenic Chamber of Commerce, 17 Valaoritou St. Athens. Greece.
- Tunisia - Farming land can only be owned by Tunisians.
- Albania - reply from the Dept. of State informing us that U.S. has no diplomatic relations with that country. Recommends contacting Alb. UN Mission in New York or one of the European embassies, but cautions that Alb. is an undesirable place to live.
- Mozambique - reply from State Dept. informing us that U.S. has no formal diplomatic relations, inquiry must be sent dir. to that country & also it is an undesirable place to live. However, they do have a Permanent Mission to the UN at 866 UN Plaza, N.Y., N.Y. 10017. or write to Peoples Rep. of Moz., in Maputo.

Angola - reply from Dept. of State advising against the idea because of Civil strife, etc. No embassy in Wash. but has a permanent Mission to the UN in N.Y. Also included lit. with background info on Angola; history. et

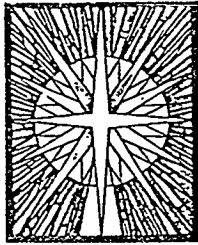
Denmark - reply regrets that Danish legislation on buying farmland is very restrictive, even for Danish citizens. Included for info some lit. regarding agric., residence, & employment.

TURKEY - advised us to write Ministry of Agriculture, Gıda-Tarım ve Hayvancılık Bakanligi, Ankara. Turkey

Honduras - Informed us our letter had been transferred to Lic. Rafael Leonardo Callejas, Ministerio de Recursos Naturales, Tegucigalpa. Honduras.
